

Plans Submitted for Phase 1 of the New Bible School



On July 5, Daniel received from EMI (Engineering Ministries International) the complete set of Architectural Plans (Structural, Electrical and Water) for Phase 1 of Central Bible Institute. Below is the artist's rendering of the Institute as designed, the Classroom Building in the foreground on the left. Phil Iekel and Jan Martinez of EMI (above) explain to Daniel the details for the Mayor's "Permit" process in their office. Anticipation is mounting as we prepare to grade the foundation and await the Mayor's final approvals.

A quick shout-out to the EMI for helping guide Daniel through Phase 1 of the Project. If you've never heard of EMI, they are an international ministry of Christian engineers serving the church through the training and discipling of young Christian architects and engineers in world standards of design. They began working with Daniel back in 2017 and have gotten us this far in the vision. We thank the Lord for EMI and are grateful for their humility and design work on behalf of the Central Bible Institute.

From this point on, Builders International (BI), a ministry of the Assemblies of God USA, is taking a larger role in guiding Daniel through the rest of the Project. We anticipate wonderful things as BI has already directed us to a Nicaraguan Project Manager who will carry the "baton" and begin the physical part of the construction. We will have more details about this new relationship for you in the future.



ISUM Comes To Nicaragua



In July, ISUM came to Managua and invited Daniel and Beatriz to teach a class in Missiology. ISUM (Institute for Advanced Ministerial Enrichment), is a traveling school focused on helping active ministers supplement their biblical and theological knowledge. Because many pastors cannot afford full-time classes for years at a time, ISUM offers intensive studies for a month each year to help better prepare themselves. Students of ISUM are pastors, presbyters, laypeople, from urban and rural areas desiring more of God.

Although we have taught Missions annually at our Bible Institute for many years, this class specialized in Cross-Cultural Communication and took a bit more preparation. And, since ISUM is a higher degree, we needed to add more in-depth material which, in the end, seemed to serve our purposes well. It was nice.

What did we teach in this class? We taught about *ethnocentrism*, or the quality that each culture thinks of itself as the basis for judging other cultures (something common to ALL cultures). We also taught about the basic models of *Communication*, for instance, how it works in practice. *Communication* begins with a *Speaker* who *Encodes* a *Message* to *Respondents* who *Decode* the *Message* while working through *Noise* and then offering *Feedback* to the *Speaker* so the *Message* is understood as intended. When missionaries cross cultures to share the Gospel, they speak a message to a different people than themselves who might not view the world as they do and might not understand our worldview. Although there are many things cultures have in common, there are hidden things that often do not translate from one culture to another.

The high point of the class, however, was the study on the *Translatability* of the Gospel and the *Kerygma*. The *Kerygma* is simply the core Gospel message that the church proclaims to wins souls for Christ. It is the message that has been proclaimed since New Testament times. *Translatability* means that God, in His sovereignty, made it possible for the Kerygma to move from culture to culture and be understood and effective as it moves. Interesting to this process is that once the Gospel is received by a culture, it takes on aspects, or clothing, of that culture in order to transform it. When the Gospel crossed from a Jewish audience to a Greek one in NT times, it answered questions about God that were unique to the Greek world. The Gospel then, on entering the culture, began transforming it from a pagan one to a holy one. Many early questions about God, His nature, and the relationship within the Trinity, all came from Greek interests.

Today, missionaries communicate the Kerygma to a new host culture every day: Jesus saves and delivers us from sin and unites us to Himself for His glory. The miracle of missions is that God uses finite and fledgling missionaries to carry that message, that Kerygma, to other parts of the world without changing it or diluting or destroying it so that message can retain its power to change and transform lives.

Leadership in Matagalpa At The Bethel Bible Institute



Upon our return to Nicaragua last year, our ministry responsibilities, although revolving around ministerial preparation and education, have changed some. Our priority is the Central Bible Institute's new Building Project. What we have not shared much about, however, is how Daniel is starting to travel throughout Nicaragua with the National Director of AG Bible Institutes, Carlos Rocha (third from the left), to present seminars and practical teachings to pastors and teachers outside the capital. This is a wonderful opportunity and we feel it is the Lord giving Daniel more exposure among those in leadership not in Managua.

On a recent trip, which was more exploratory in nature and not teaching, Daniel took John Sims of Builders International (fourth from the left) with him to investigate the physical needs of the Bethel Bible Institute in Matagalpa. The school, located about three hours in the mountains, is supervised by Executive Presbyter Terencio Blanco (middle in blue) and his leadership team. Daniel has known these men from our years of service in Nicaragua. What he did not know was the extent of the needs of this school's buildings. Bethel has solid infrastructure but the school was really never finished and also, presently, is in need of a lot of renovation. Since the civil unrest of 2018, Covid-19 and economic downturns here, the school has been left at a standstill without funding. The Lord has put it in Daniel's heart to help with this work.

So, what are we asking? For smaller teams to come help with smaller, mini-projects. For example, the school has buildings (classrooms, dorms, etc.) with cement floors, but without tiling; the buildings have slots for windows with security bars, but no window units; the buildings have proper roofs, but the rooms have no drop ceilings or light fixtures. These are just some of the smaller jobs small teams could help with.

Without take away from our work at the Central School, Daniel feels the needs of the Bethel Institute are worth investing in. In this regard, there is no pressure to perform big acts of heroism for teams if they were to come to help in Matagalpa. There is just an opportunity for helping the school in practical ways.
